

# **MEDICAID (MEDI-CAL)** & CALIFORNIA KIDS



Medicaid – called Medi-Cal in California – provides health care coverage for 15 million people in California, covering more than half of all children and 1 in 3 people in our great state. In fact, the Congressional district with the highest percentage of people who rely on Medicaid in the entire country is right here in California: District 22, which includes parts of Kings, Tulare and Kern counties and is represented by Republican David Valadao, where nearly 9 in 10 children are enrolled in the program.

**Rushing cuts to Medicaid's budget would devastate Medi-Cal,** which gets about half of its funding from the federal government. This would leave California on the hook to make up that huge shortfall from its own state budget – adding to further uncertainty due to the devastating wildfires and continued challenging pandemic recovery.

- More than 5 million children in California rely on Medi-Cal.
- Nearly half (49.1%) of children in small towns and rural areas in California have health insurance because of Medi-Cal.
- 3 out of 4 children who get their health insurance from Medi-Cal are children of color.
- Medi-Cal is the primary source of coverage for Latine and Black children in California.
- Medi-Cal pays for 40% of California births and helps ensure access to critical prenatal care, maternity care and postpartum services.
- Medi-Cal covers 28% of children in California with special health care needs and disabilities, providing medical, behavioral health and long-term care.

## **Long-term Impacts of Medicaid for Children**

- Children who rely on Medicaid do better in school and miss fewer school days.
- Youth who get their health insurance from Medicaid are more likely to graduate from high school and go to college.
- Children who have Medicaid coverage have fewer emergency room visits and hospitalizations as adults.
- Children and youth who have Medicaid earn more money as adults than children without health care coverage.

### Children with Disabilities and Medicaid

- In the United States, over 6 million kids with disabilities get their health insurance from Medicaid.
- Medicaid pays for 70% of long-term health services; most of these services are not covered by Medicare or private insurance.

## **Schools and Medicaid**

- Medicaid is the third-largest source of funding for K-12 public schools, and provides physical, mental and behavioral health services to eligible students.
- Medicaid helps schools provide services such as routine health screenings, preventive care, and physical, speech and occupational therapies.
- Medicaid reimburses schools for services provided to students with disabilities and students from low-income families.
- In 2023, Medi-Cal provided over \$620 million in funding to California schools and reimburses eligible providers, including school counselors, psychologists, social workers, licensed clinical social workers, and licensed educational psychologists, providing both crucial care to students and jobs for adults.

#### **Mental Health and Medicaid**

- California's children face a mental health crisis, and for many of them Medi-Cal is their only lifeline. 1 in 3 teenagers is now experiencing serious psychological distress and opioid-related overdoses among teens have tripled.
- Medicaid is the **largest source of federal funding for mental health services**, supporting mental and behavioral health treatment for children, adolescents and adults.
- Medicaid helps schools address gaps in behavioral health services, including mental health counseling.

# Medicaid and the Economy

- Cuts to Medicaid will do nothing to lower health care costs or improve quality and access to care. In fact, these massive cuts will make our health care problems worse by sharply increasing costs, medical debt and financial insecurity for children and families.
- Schools will no longer be able to offer much-needed programming and resources to support students' health.
- Health care will become more expensive for everyone, including people with private insurance.
- Families will be forced to pay even more out of pocket.
- Providers will raise their costs to compensate for fewer Medicaid dollars.
- Businesses will have to pay more to insure their workforces, passing along that cost to their employees in the form of higher premiums.
- Hospitals (including children's hospitals), birthing centers, community health clinics and nursing homes may be in danger of closing, leading to widespread layoffs, emergency room overcrowding and less access to care.
